What is the CFCC?

The California Financing Coordinating Committee (CFCC) was formed in 1998 to facilitate and expedite the completion of infrastructure projects by helping interested parties identify and combine the resources of various state and federal financing sources. The CFCC has seven members: six state, one federal. CFCC members share project information so additional resources can be identified. Funding from CFCC members may be in the form of grants or loans. Members conduct statewide training each year to educate interested parties about the CFCC and the financial and technical resources available.

Purpose of Funding Fairs

CFCC funding fairs provide members of the public and infrastructure development professionals current information on funding options available for different project types. Interested parties attending a funding fair receive a CFCC handbook and informational handouts describing available financial and technical assistance. The handbook includes CFCC member contact information, project matrices showing funding sources by project type, and copies of all the PowerPoint presentations given by members. Attendees of a funding fair can network with persons experienced with similar projects and the CFCC members. CFCC funding fairs are free.

Who should attend?

Public works and local government representatives including city managers and planners, economic development and engineering professionals, officials from privately owned facilities, financial advisors and project consultants.

What happens at a Funding Fair?

The morning of each funding fair is spent listening to presentations from each of the different funding agencies. Agency staff will describe funding programs available for different types of projects and the application process for accessing the funds. Participants may ask questions of staff during the presentations. In the afternoon participants can sit down "one-on-one" with each of the different funding agencies to review any proposed projects. The project can be evaluated and direction given as to availability of funding and steps needed to submit an application. By providing this direct technical assistance around the state, the CFCC hopes to encourage project developers, large or small, to discuss proposals with CFCC staff.

Examples of CFCC Projects



Bakersfield Redevelopment Agency Millcreek Linear Park and Canal Refurbishment (Kern County). Project funding paid for improvements to the Kern Island Canal and Millcreek Linear Park helping to revitalize and preserve the central city. Improvements included: rebuilding storm drains; refurbishing an existing pond; reconstructing adjacent streets; and adding pedestrian walkways, plazas and bike paths. The project increased public safety and provided improved flood protection. Total project cost was \$12,700,000 with \$10,000,000 funded by the I-Bank and \$2,700,000 funded by the Agency.



City of Arcata Business Assistance Loan to Humboldt Flakeboard Plywood Manufacturer for New Air Filter System Project (Humboldt County). The \$5 million dollar project was funded by a \$2.5 million State Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) grant to the city, which they loaned to the company, and \$2.5 million provided by the business. The project's air cleaning system uses a "green" bio-filtration method. The new system allowed the business to meet new air quality standards and stay open. The project preserved the plywood manufacturing facility, which has been in operation since 1956 and saved over 70 jobs.



North Marin Water District Recycled Water Project (Marin County). Total project funding is \$5.04 million, with \$4.27 million in State Water Resources Control Board Clean Water State Revolving Fund financing, \$0.24 million from a Department of Water Resources Grant, and \$0.53 million from local revenue sources. The North Marin Water District (NMWD) and Novato Sanitary District (NSD) constructed a 0.5 million gallons per day (MGD) recycled water facility (RWF) for landscape irrigation at the Stone Tree golf course in Novato, which delivers water to the NSD and Novato Fire Protection District (NFPD). The facility treats secondary wastewater effluent to Title 22 requirements for landscape irrigation. This project is NMWD's and NSD's first step at introducing the use of recycled water within the Novato Service Area.



Montara Water and Sanitary District Kanoff and Niagara Pump Stations Renovation and Upgrade (San Mateo County). Project funding paid for the renovation of two outdated sewer pump stations located along the California coastline. Constructed over 30 years ago, the facilities were at the end of their useful lives, undersized for today's needs, and a health and safety hazard during extreme weather conditions. Improvements included upgrading deficient structures and replacing old equipment. Total cost was \$1,365,000 with \$1,010,000 funded by the I-Bank, a State Water Resources Control Board Clean Beaches Initiative Grant (Proposition 40) of \$250,000, and the District's contribution of \$105,000.
